

Two Research Projects Receive HHRF Funding

The board and staff of Horses and Humans Research Foundation are pleased to announce the exciting results of our 2010 grant awards. The HHRF board of directors have selected two very impressive research proposals!

The first proposal, Basic Neurobiological and Psychological Mechanisms Underlying Therapeutic Effects of Equine Assisted Activities (EAA/T), will be a joint effort by researchers from Germany, Austria and Sweden. This team of investigators led by Dr. Andrea Beetz of the University of Rostock, Germany will conduct two randomized trials investigating the benefit of EAA compared to conventional therapy with regard to the reduction of stress and the facilitation of trust and connection to others. The measures are based on attachment theory and known effects of the hormone oxytocin.

The second proposal, Effects of Hippo-

therapy on Balance and Gait in Ambulatory Children with Spastic Cerebral Palsy, is being headed by Debbie Silkwood-Sherer of Central Michigan University and Nancy McGibbon of Therapeutic Riding of Tucson, Inc. The purpose of this randomized controlled clinical trial is to determine if 12 weeks of hippotherapy, when added to the usual therapy for young children with CP, will improve their balance and gait more than their usual therapy alone. The investigating team will also evaluate the children's visual motor integration, activities, participation and quality of life before and after hippotherapy.

We were pleased to receive thirty-seven high quality applications from nineteen states in the United States and from seven different countries. Twenty-seven universities were represented as well as over thirty EAA/T programs. Interestingly, the vast majority of the applications were related to mental health. To see more de-

Molly Sweeney Wins James Brady Memorial Award

Molly Sweeney, President and Founder of HHRF, has been awarded the prestigious 2010 James Brady Professional Achievement Award. The award was presented during the 2010 NARHA National Conference and Annual Banquet held in Denver, Colorado. The award is presented only once a year, in the name of James Brady, by NARHA to a professional who has made a significant contribution to equine assisted activities/therapies (EAA/T).

Molly is a lifelong horse-woman, born into a strongly equine-focused family. She claims that horses simply are in her genes. When endorsements started arriving in the mail to nominate Molly for this prestigious James Brady award, the warm accolades were impressive and touching.

One of the endorsements read: "I write at this time to give my strongest possible endorsement and support that Molly Sweeney should be presented with the 2010 James Brady Award. Frankly, I am a little dumbfounded that we have not given

it to her already! Her efforts on behalf of equine-assisted activities, SIRE, NARHA, and the Horses and Humans Research Foundation are legion, and legend. What is even more outstanding, however, is that she has accomplished all these things with exceptional grace and kindness."

Molly's affiliation with equine-assisted activities started in 1989, volunteering at

SIRE in Houston, TX. By 1994 she was recruited to SIRE's Board of Directors and by January, 1997, she was elected president of the board, a position she held for twelve years, leading SIRE in tremendous program growth. Molly went on to serve six years on the NARHA board and also started other important projects like the master instructor's symposium.

Molly recognized early that all EAA/T progress relied on developing evidence-based practices through the highest levels of published scientific research. When it did not appear that any existing organization was positioned to put the needed focus and funding into research, she stepped

forward and established a team to create a publicly funded foundation to assure the research would be developed. Her support as founder and president of Horses and Humans Research Foundation has helped spread interest in and commitment to rigorously developed research, opening doors to an exciting the future.

President's Perspective

In our short history, more than sixty equine-assisted activity programs and associations have supported HHRF research. In appreciation of their contributions, HHRF is dedicating this news letter to these visionary board and staff teams who have made this investment in the future a priority.

They have recognized the importance of data and statistics that show the full extent of the ability of the horse to facilitate healing and learning. These results are proving to be much greater than we thought in many areas. From these statistics, instructors and facilitators are gaining greater clarity on how to further develop best evidence-based practices related to their specific clients.

The stakeholders at these programs already know the value of EAA/T. Each one has a tight budget, yet they have found ways to contribute to this research. Their vision and commitment to the future of EAA/T makes them leaders in our field.

We, in turn, are committed to energetically continue our support of research that will scientifically validate the ability of horses to inspire, to empower, to heal and to teach. We will relentlessly pursue the research results that you need to reassure clients, to educate medical professionals, to write foundation requests, to entice donors and to convince insurance companies of the ability of a horse to improve the life of a person.

HHRF was also honored to receive a grant in the amount of \$5,000 from The EQUUS Foundation. This grant will support assembling industry leaders from academic, equine, research, EAA/T, medical and business backgrounds at a symposium focused on advancing the EAA/T efforts in areas related to research and research support.

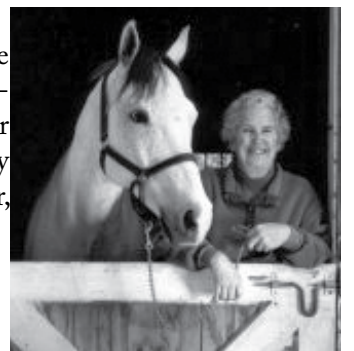
