RESEARCH 2017 ANNUAL REPORT

MISSION AND GOALS:

Through investment in rigorous research, Horses and Humans Research Foundation will serve as a catalyst to advance knowledge of horses and their potential to impact on the health and wellness of people. The primary goal is to support, promote and fund scientific research that explores the claimed, yet unsubstantiated benefits of equine-assisted activities and therapies, leading to the discovery of the most effective methods and techniques for conducting thousands of existing and future programs. The secondary goal is to educate the public (including parents, donors, insurance companies and physicians) on research findings so that equine-assisted activities become more accessible to those in need.

FUNDING AREAS, PUBLICATION RECORDS:

HHRF has funded twelve equine-assisted activities projects in as many years. Ten projects have been completed. Three of the awarded projects studied Cerebral Palsy/movement/balance, three on post-traumatic stress disorder, three on autism, one regarding children with bonding issues, one on the horse's response to physical/cognitive disorders and one on evaluating the impact of the dynamic surface of the moving horse on its rider. Ten articles related to these projects have been published in scientific journals.

Texas A&M Team Awarded Research Grant Funding:

HHRF awarded \$10,000 to Texas A&M University "Tracking Kinematic and Kinetic Data during Horse Riding for Optimizing Therapeutic Outcomes." Funded in late 2017, this study will investigate the impact the movement of a horse has on the rider by measuring both horse and rider simultaneously. This innovative project relies on new, technologically advanced sensors, to be placed on both rider and horse, to collect data on the movements experienced by the rider while on the dynamic surface of the horse.

HHRF's financial position remains very stable. Contributions and grants increased in 2017 due to an increase in several foundation grants, which allowed us to rely less on individual contributions. Our second Innovative Grant was awarded in 2017. Other expenses increased by a modest 1.2% from their 2016 levels even after our strategic management changes. In 2017 our Endowment provided earnings for general use of over \$11,400. Overall, 2017 showed us building a solid base on which to grow Horses and Humans Research Foundation to a new level.
